# SPANISH 1BC Summer Session 2 2016 COURSE INFORMATION SHEET

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## Course Description:

The Spanish 1 Series (A, B, C) employs a proficiency-oriented, task-based approach, designed to develop basic oral communicative abilities in Spanish. In order to support these abilities you will also be introduced to beginning grammar as well as speaking, listening, reading, and writing skills. **Class will be conducted in Spanish.**

## Class Dynamics:

I will attempt to balance a relaxed atmosphere, where students will be willing to use Spanish without fear of criticism, with the need for academic excellence. Try, however, not to get as comfortable with the class so as to not study enough; some anxiety about academic performance is always helpful. On the other hand, avoid getting so tense that you "freeze up". Please, avoid monopolizing the class, or otherwise creating an uncomfortable atmosphere for your classmates. Remember that I am always available during my office hours to help you.

## **Academic Dishonesty:**

#### Workload:

Students with a large course- or workload and students with weak studying skills/habits are not encouraged to take this class until they solve those problems first. Each 50 minute class period will require approximately two to three hours a day of careful and systematic studying. Without sufficient time and solid studying skills/habits, you will struggle to pass this class. You are strongly advised to evaluate your own situation carefully before deciding to stay in the class.

### **Attendance Policy:**

Class attendance is <u>mandatory</u>. Regular class attendance is expected and essential for successful completion of the course. You are allowed one excused-absence during this course. For each absence beyond that one, your course grade will be lowered by 2.5%. I will count three "tardies" as one absence. A tardy is defined as arrival to class after 10 minutes. Tardy arrival more than 15 minutes late to class constitutes an absence.

# **Participation Policy**:

You are expected to participate in ALL class activities. In order to participate you must be present. If you're not present, -you can't participate! Roll will be taken every day. Class participation includes your contribution, in Spanish, in regular class, as well as in small group activities. You are expected to study all the vocabulary and grammar points at home, ahead of class, so that the limited class time can be spent on practicing and reinforcing the language, rather than mere lecturing. If you are not in class, or in class, but unprepared, or you do not participate, your course grade will be lowered by 1% percent per day.

## Homework Assignments: (5% total grade)

These assignments are part of the course, and consist of material(s) assigned to be completed outside of the classroom, such as Connect online exercises, exercises from the book, exercises in the computer lab, short oral presentations, etc. The goal of the homework is to help students identify problem areas. Students are encouraged to clarify any remaining questions with the instructor immediately. You will have daily homework to be completed online (<a href="http://connect.mcgraw-hill.com/">http://connect.mcgraw-hill.com/</a>).

If you have to be absent, you are expected to call a classmate to find out the assignment for the next day so that you will not fall behind. If you miss a day, you are expected to turn in the online homework on time. No late assignments will be accepted.

You must submit the journals via <a href="www.turnitin.com">www.turnitin.com</a> by 9am on Saturdays; no extensions will be made for late work. The class code for this class is: 12867299 (password: zotzot). I will assign a specific topic for each week, and I will dialogue with you on each journal entry. As a general rule, your Spanish will not be corrected. You are expected to turn in one journal entry per week. The approximate length of each journal entry is 200-250 words. All topics have been assigned and are available on the class website. A missing entry will result in a reduction of your course grade by 2.0 percent.

# Quizzes: (50% total grade)

There will be five quizzes during the course. Each quiz covers two chapters from the textbook. Testing schedule is available on the class calendar. Each test will cover: reading comprehension, listening comprehension, vocabulary, and grammar. There are NO MAKE-UPs for tests. If a test is missed due to a documented police, court or medical emergency of your own, the next test or quiz will count double; permission to make-up the last test or quiz is given solely at my discretion.

## Oral Exam: (25% total grade)

There will be **two (2) Oral Exams** throughout the quarter to test your proficiency in Spanish. You will work will an assigned peer for these presentations. Details will be announced further along in the quarter.

## Final Exam: (10% total grade)

This exam will reflect the overall emphasis given to most of the important skills and tasks practiced in class. The Final exam will be held on July 29-30<sup>th</sup>. You will be informed over the date, time, location, as soon as they are finalized.

There are no opportunities for extra credit during this course.
